Proposal Overview: Recovery Without Barriers

Union Mission Ministries respectfully requests \$100,000 from the Kanawha County Commission Opioid Settlement Fund to support construction of Recovery Without Barriers, a new 24-bed, ADA-compliant residential Substance Use Disorder (SUD) and Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) treatment facility in Charleston, West Virginia. The project will eliminate a significant barrier within Kanawha County's recovery continuum by creating the county's first ADA-accessible supervised residential treatment facility. It will also improve retention and long-term addiction recovery outcomes by relocating Union Mission's existing certified long-term addiction recovery program to a purpose-built recovery campus.

Purpose and Key Anticipated Outcomes

The purpose of this project is to eliminate significant barriers to opioid and substance use disorder treatment by creating the only ADA-compliant supervised residential recovery facility for men in Kanawha County. The project will:

- Increase ADA-accessible supervised residential recovery beds in Kanawha County from 0% to 100%.
- Improve access to treatment for men with physical disabilities, co-occurring mental health conditions, and justice involvement.
- Reduce relapse risk by relocating treatment onto a purpose-built recovery environment to increase recovery outcomes
- Improve treatment retention and long-term addiction recovery outcomes.
- Strengthen community reintegration, employment readiness, housing stability, and family reunification for participants.

Individuals and Communities Served

The project will serve adult men with Substance Use Disorder and Opioid Use Disorder, including:

- Residents of Kanawha County and the surrounding region.
- Individuals with mobility limitations and disabilities.
- Justice-involved individuals referred by courts, probation and parole, and correctional facilities.
- Individuals with co-occurring mental health conditions.
- Low-income individuals who cannot afford private treatment services.

Funding Requested

Union Mission Ministries is requesting \$100,000 from the Kanawha County Commission Opioid Settlement Fund.

Project Cost and Cost Estimates

Union Mission has received contractor pricing and executed a construction contract for the project. The current total project cost is \$1,208,941.12.

Matching Funds Raised or Committed

Union Mission has secured \$902,571.48 toward the project cost.

Use of Opioid Settlement Funds

If awarded, Opioid Settlement Funds will be used exclusively for construction costs associated with the new ADA-compliant recovery facility, including building construction, infrastructure, accessibility features, and other eligible capital expenses required to complete the project. The funding will directly support expansion of treatment capacity and improved access to opioid recovery services for Kanawha County residents.

Core Strategies and Approved Uses Supported

This project aligns with the approved uses of opioid settlement funds by:

- Expanding treatment for Opioid Use Disorder and Substance Use Disorder.
- Supporting recovery housing and recovery support services.
- Increasing access to care for underserved and high-risk populations.
- Addressing barriers to treatment for individuals with disabilities.
- Supporting justice-involved individuals seeking addiction recovery.
- Reducing overdose risk, relapse, and recidivism through long-term residential treatment.
- Strengthening the continuum of care for opioid-impacted individuals and families in Kanawha County.

Project Timeline

Construction is currently underway. If awarded funding, Union Mission anticipates:

- Continued construction and build-out through 2026.
- Facility completion and final inspections by September 2026.
- Program transition and occupancy by October 2026.

The project is expected to be fully operational within approximately three months, allowing Kanawha County residents to benefit from expanded opioid recovery services as quickly as possible.

Section Three: Proposal details

Please describe the problem or need that your project seeks to address.

Kanawha County and the State of West Virginia continue to face one of the most severe opioid and substance use crises in the nation. While treatment and recovery resources exist, a significant gap remains for individuals with physical disabilities who require long-term residential treatment services. Union Mission Ministries seeks to address this gap through the construction of Recovery Without Barriers, a 24-bed, ADA-compliant residential Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatment facility in Charleston, West Virginia.

West Virginia has both the highest disability prevalence in the country ([US Census Bureau](#)) and the highest overdose mortality rates ([CDC-Drug Overdose Mortality](#)), meaning many West Virginians in need of SUD treatment also require accommodation that existing programs do not provide. Research has shown that individuals with disabilities experience substance use disorders at significantly higher rates than the general population, yet often face substantial barriers to treatment due to inaccessible facilities and services ([CDC Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report](#)). Despite Kanawha County being the state's most populous county and a regional hub for recovery services, there are currently no ADA-accessible supervised residential treatment beds for men available within the county ([WVARR Directory of Residences](#)).

Union Mission routinely receives referrals from courts, correctional facilities, healthcare providers, and community partners throughout the region for men with mobility limitations. Union Mission's existing residential recovery facility was constructed in the 1960s and cannot be feasibly renovated to meet modern ADA accessibility standards. Individuals with mobility limitations are effectively excluded from participation in the program because the building lacks the accessibility features necessary to accommodate them. As a result, many Kanawha County residents with physical disabilities who are seeking recovery from opioid and substance use disorders have limited or no access to appropriate long-term residential treatment.

The current treatment facility also sits adjacent to a high-crime area where illegal drug activity is common. This environment creates additional challenges for individuals in early recovery, increasing exposure to triggers and opportunities for relapse during the most vulnerable stages of treatment. Union Mission has documented instances where residents encountered illicit substances immediately outside the facility, undermining recovery efforts and contributing to premature program exits. Currently, approximately 21% of residents leave treatment within the first two weeks, often influenced by environmental factors associated with the facility's location.

The need is particularly acute among justice-involved individuals, those with co-occurring mental health conditions, and individuals with limited financial resources. Along with referrals from hospitals, community partners, and program graduates, roughly 75% of Union Mission's residents are referred through courts, probation and parole, and correctional facilities. These individuals often require structured, long-term recovery support to avoid relapse, overdose, homelessness, and recidivism.

Recovery Without Barriers will directly address these challenges by creating the first ADA-compliant supervised residential addiction recovery facility (WVARR Level 3) for men in Kanawha County. The project will provide a safe, purpose-built environment where individuals recovering from opioid and substance use disorders can access evidence-based treatment, behavioral health services, life-skills training, recovery support, and peer mentorship regardless of physical ability. The facility will increase ADA-accessible supervised treatment capacity in Kanawha County from 0% to 100%, reduce barriers to care, improve treatment retention, and strengthen long-term recovery outcomes for some of the community's most vulnerable residents.

By expanding access to treatment and recovery services for individuals impacted by opioid use disorder, especially those who currently face significant barriers to care, this project will strengthen Kanawha County's recovery continuum, reduce overdose risk, support successful community reintegration, and improve the health and well-being of residents and families affected by addiction.

Please describe the purpose and objectives of your proposal.

The purpose of Recovery Without Barriers is to expand access to long-term residential treatment and recovery services for individuals affected by Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and Substance Use Disorder (SUD) by constructing a new 24-bed ADA-compliant recovery facility in Charleston, West Virginia. The project will eliminate a significant barrier within Kanawha County's recovery continuum by creating the county's first ADA-accessible supervised residential treatment facility (WVARR Level 3) for men, ensuring that individuals with mobility limitations have equitable access to evidence-based recovery services.

The project is designed to address two critical challenges: the lack of ADA-accessible residential treatment beds in Kanawha County and the need to relocate recovery services from an environment where nearby drug activity undermines participant recovery efforts. By creating a purpose-built recovery campus, the project will improve safety, accessibility, treatment engagement, and long-term recovery outcomes for individuals impacted by opioid and substance use disorders.

Objectives

Increase Access to Treatment

- Establish the first ADA-compliant supervised residential recovery facility (WVARR Level 3) for men in Kanawha County.
- Increase ADA-accessible supervised residential treatment capacity in Kanawha County from 0% to 100%.
- Ensure individuals with physical disabilities can access long-term recovery services without barriers.

Improve Recovery Outcomes

- Provide a safe, structured, 24-bed residential treatment environment for individuals recovering from opioid and substance use disorders.
- Increase participation among individuals requiring accessibility accommodations.
- Improve treatment retention by reducing environmental triggers associated with the current facility location.

Reduce Relapse, Overdose, and Recidivism

- Support participants through evidence-based recovery programming, behavioral health services, peer support, life-skills training, and recovery-focused housing.
- Reduce the risk of relapse and overdose by providing long-term residential care in a secure recovery environment.
- Strengthen outcomes for justice-involved individuals seeking recovery and community reintegration.

Promote Long-Term Stability

- Increase successful transitions to employment, sober living, stable housing, and community reintegration.
- Support participants in achieving sustained recovery, self-sufficiency, and improved quality of life.
- Strengthen Kanawha County's overall addiction recovery infrastructure and continuum of care for individuals and families affected by the opioid epidemic.

Upon opening, Recovery Without Barriers will provide 24 ADA-accessible residential recovery beds and serve approximately 144 men annually. The facility will increase access to treatment for individuals with mobility limitations while supporting improved treatment retention, long-term recovery, housing stability, employment, and successful community reintegration outcomes for Kanawha County residents affected by substance use disorder.

Through Recovery Without Barriers, Union Mission will create a lasting community asset that expands treatment capacity, promotes health equity, and provides individuals affected by opioid addiction with a safe and accessible pathway to long-term recovery.

Please provide details regarding the design and strategy of your proposal.

Recovery Without Barriers is a construction project designed to expand access to long-term recovery services for individuals affected by OUD and SUD by constructing a new 24-bed, ADA-compliant residential treatment facility on Union Mission Ministries' recovery campus in Charleston, West Virginia. The facility will replace Union Mission's existing residential treatment building, which cannot be feasibly renovated to meet modern accessibility standards and whose location undermines recovery efforts.

The project strategy focuses on removing both physical and environmental barriers to recovery. The new facility will be a single-story, purpose-built structure designed to provide equal access to treatment for individuals with mobility limitations while creating a safe, secure environment that promotes long-term sobriety and successful community reintegration. By relocating the treatment program onto Union Mission's existing recovery campus, participants will have access to a comprehensive continuum of care that includes residential treatment, behavioral health services, sober living, peer support, life-skills training, employment readiness services, and ongoing recovery support.

The building will house Union Mission's WV Alliance of Recovery Residences (WVARR) and WV Office of Health Facilities Licensure and Certification (OHFLAC) certified residential recovery program and will feature twelve double-occupancy bedrooms, accessible bathrooms, staff offices, common living areas, a commercial kitchen, dining space, and outdoor recreational areas. The facility has been specifically designed to comply with ADA requirements and support individuals with physical disabilities who currently have limited access to long-term residential treatment opportunities in Kanawha County.

The recovery program operating within the facility utilizes evidence-based and best-practice approaches recommended by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), WVARR, and OHFLAC. Services include cognitive behavioral therapy, dialectical behavior therapy, trauma-informed counseling, relapse prevention programming, peer support, life-skills education, financial literacy, employment readiness training, and recovery-focused case management. Participants also receive coordinated medical and behavioral health services through community healthcare partners.

The project's implementation strategy builds upon an established and successful recovery program already operating within Kanawha County. Rather than creating a new program, the project strengthens existing services by increasing accessibility, improving safety, and enhancing recovery outcomes.

Construction activities are being completed by Burdette Realty Improvement Inc., a licensed West Virginia contractor selected through the Union Mission Board of Directors. The project has a total budget of \$1,208,941.12, with \$902,571.48 already secured through state funding, property sales, fundraising efforts, private donations, and organizational investments. The requested Opioid Settlement funding will help complete construction and ensure the facility is available to serve residents affected by opioid addiction as quickly as possible.

Upon completion, Recovery Without Barriers will create the first ADA-accessible supervised residential treatment facility for men in Kanawha County, increase access to treatment for underserved populations, improve participant retention, reduce relapse risk, and strengthen the county's continuum of care for individuals and families impacted by the opioid epidemic.

Union Mission Ministries has initiated the Recovery Without Barriers project and secured \$902,571.48 toward the total project cost of \$1,208,941.12. Construction activities are underway, and Opioid Settlement funding will help complete the final phase of the project.

The total proposed budget for the Recovery Without Barriers project is \$1,208,941.12. Union Mission Ministries has already secured \$902,571.48, representing approximately 75% of the total project cost. The requested \$100,000 from the Kanawha County Commission Opioid Settlement Fund will be applied directly to construction costs associated with the new 24-bed ADA-compliant residential Substance Use Disorder treatment facility, leaving a remaining funding gap of \$206,369.64, which Union Mission will address through ongoing fundraising efforts.

Union Mission Ministries collaborates with a broad network of partners that support substance use disorder treatment, healthcare access, reentry services, and community reintegration. Recovery Without Barriers builds upon these existing partnerships and strengthens the continuum of care for individuals affected by opioid and substance use disorders.

Burdette Realty Improvement, Inc. (BRI)

- **Role:** General contractor responsible for construction of the new ADA-compliant recovery facility, including project management, permitting, inspections, labor, and materials.
- **Relationship:** Union Mission contracted with BRI following a competitive review process conducted by the Board of Directors. BRI designed the facility and is overseeing construction through project completion.

Anchor Medical Systems

- **Role:** Healthcare partner providing medical care, mental health assessments, and treatment for co-occurring disorders.

The new facility will strengthen these collaborative efforts by expanding treatment capacity and increasing access to recovery services for individuals with disabilities in Kanawha County.

The Recovery Without Barriers project is led by Union Mission Ministries' executive leadership team, which possesses extensive experience in nonprofit administration, financial management, behavioral health services, addiction recovery programming, and capital project oversight.

Chief Executive Officer Jason Quintrell provides overall project leadership and strategic oversight, stakeholder engagement, fundraising coordination, and organizational accountability. He oversees all Union Mission operations, capital projects, community partnerships, and program development. Mr. Quintrell has successfully led multiple facility improvement projects and the expansion of Union

Mission's addiction recovery services.

Director of Finance Kelly McClung oversees financial management, budget tracking, grant compliance, contractor payments, reporting requirements, and fiscal stewardship of project funds. She has more than 25 years of experience in accounting, finance, auditing, and nonprofit financial management.

Recovery Director Ashley Smith, LPC, oversees operational planning, program implementation, and integration of services within the new facility. Mrs. Smith is responsible for the administration of Union Mission's WVARR- and OHFLAC-certified recovery program, staff supervision, regulatory compliance, quality assurance, participant outcomes, and coordination with referral partners. Ms. Smith also serves as Clinical Director of Union Mission Behavioral Health Center and brings extensive expertise in substance use disorder treatment and behavioral healthcare.

Construction activities are being managed by Burdette Realty Improvement, Inc. (BRI), a licensed West Virginia contractor responsible for project execution, permitting, inspections, and completion of the ADA-compliant building. BRI was selected by Union Mission's Board of Directors and has already begun construction activities.

Together, this team has successfully managed recovery programming, facility improvements, and community partnerships that support individuals recovering from opioid and substance use disorders.

Please describe your plan for sustainability of the project or initiative after the grant award has been exhausted.

Union Mission Ministries has a strong and time-tested sustainability plan to ensure that Recovery Without Barriers remains operational and impactful long after construction is complete and grant funds have been expended. The requested Opioid Settlement funding will support a one-time capital investment in the construction of the facility; ongoing program operations will be sustained through Union Mission's established funding streams, community partnerships, and more than a century of nonprofit service experience.

Union Mission has served West Virginians since 1911 and currently operates a diversified funding model that supports its addiction recovery, shelter, outreach, and family assistance programs. The organization's annual operating budget is supported through individual donations, church partnerships, estate gifts, thrift store revenue, special events, investment income, rental properties, sober living fees, and grant funding. This diversified approach reduces reliance on any single funding source and provides long-term financial stability.

The recovery program itself is already operational and financially supported through Union Mission's existing infrastructure. The new facility does not create a new program but rather provides a purpose-built, ADA-compliant facility that will improve accessibility, safety, and participant outcomes. As a result, ongoing staffing, programming, and service delivery models are already established and incorporated into the organization's operational budget.

Union Mission also benefits from extensive community support. In 2025, volunteers contributed 8,448.5 hours of service valued at more than \$246,090, providing critical support for recovery services, shelter operations, food distribution, outreach programs, and other mission-driven activities. These volunteer partnerships expand organizational capacity, strengthen service delivery, and reduce operating costs, allowing Union Mission to direct more resources toward programs that support individuals and families affected by substance use disorder, homelessness, and poverty.

The organization will continue to pursue public and private grant opportunities to support recovery programming and facility improvements, while maintaining strong partnerships with healthcare providers, courts, probation and parole, correctional facilities, behavioral health organizations, and recovery service providers. These collaborative relationships help ensure a consistent referral pipeline and ongoing access to supportive services for participants.

Additionally, Union Mission's Board of Directors and leadership team remain committed to maintaining the facility and expanding recovery services as community needs evolve. The facility is being constructed as a long-term asset designed to serve Kanawha County residents for decades, increasing access to treatment for individuals affected by opioid and substance use disorders while strengthening the region's recovery infrastructure.

Through diversified revenue streams, established operational capacity, strong community support, experienced leadership, and ongoing fundraising efforts, Union Mission is well positioned to sustain Recovery Without Barriers and continue providing accessible, high-quality recovery services long after the grant award has been exhausted.

Union Mission Ministries actively shares the love of Christ by addressing the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of individuals facing homelessness, addiction, and hardship. Through faith-centered compassion, practical support, and life-transforming programs, we restore hope, rebuild lives, and renew communities, one person at a time.

Describe the history of your organization.

Union Mission Ministries, Inc. has served West Virginians since **1911**, when it was founded in Charleston as a soup kitchen dedicated to helping individuals and families experiencing poverty and hardship. Over the past 115 years, the organization has grown into one of the region's most trusted nonprofit service providers, continually adapting its programs to meet emerging community needs while remaining committed to its mission of helping those facing homelessness, addiction, hunger, and other life challenges.

Throughout its history, Union Mission has expanded beyond emergency food assistance to provide a comprehensive continuum of services that address both immediate needs and long-term stability. As community needs evolved, Union Mission responded by developing specialized programs designed to help individuals overcome barriers to independence and self-sufficiency.

Today, Union Mission operates a men's homeless shelter, a WVARR- and OHFLAC-certified addiction recovery program with residential treatment and sober living services, behavioral health services through subsidiary Union Mission Behavioral Health Center, family resource and food distribution programs, outreach initiatives serving communities throughout West Virginia, thrift enterprises, and emergency response efforts. These programs serve thousands of individuals annually across a broad geographic region.

A defining characteristic of Union Mission's history has been its commitment to serving vulnerable populations who often have limited access to care, including individuals experiencing homelessness, substance use disorders, and hunger. The organization has developed strong partnerships with healthcare providers, courts, probation and parole, correctional facilities, schools, churches, community

organizations, and state agencies to ensure participants receive comprehensive support and access to needed resources.

Union Mission is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors and supported by professional staff, community volunteers, churches, businesses, foundations, and individual donors. Through more than a century of service, the organization has maintained a reputation for compassionate care, responsible stewardship, and measurable outcomes that help individuals restore hope, rebuild their lives, and successfully reintegrate into their communities.

Recovery Without Barriers continues to build on this legacy, a project that will create the first ADA-compliant supervised residential recovery facility for men in Kanawha County and expand access to treatment for individuals affected by opioid and substance use disorders. The project reflects Union Mission's longstanding commitment to identifying unmet community needs and developing sustainable solutions that improve lives throughout West Virginia.

Tell us about your current programs and activities:

Union Mission Ministries provides a comprehensive continuum of services designed to address the interconnected challenges of homelessness, addiction, hunger, and poverty throughout West Virginia. Since 1911, the organization has adapted its programs to meet emerging community needs while helping individuals achieve stability, independence, and long-term success.

Addiction Recovery Program

Union Mission operates a WVARR and OHFLAC certified recovery program for men experiencing SUD and OUD. The program includes long-term residential treatment, sober living opportunities, peer support, behavioral health services, life-skills training, employment readiness, relapse prevention, and recovery coaching. Services are provided at no cost to participants and we are able to serve those with Serious Mental Illness, and justice-involved individuals referred through courts, probation and parole, and correctional facilities.

Following completion of residential treatment, participants may transition into Union Mission's structured sober living program. This step-down model provides ongoing accountability, peer support, employment assistance, and recovery support while participants reintegrate into the community and work toward independent living.

Union Mission Behavioral Health Center

The organization's behavioral health center provides counseling, therapy, peer recovery support, mental health services, and treatment for co-occurring disorders.

The center supports both recovery program participants and community members who require behavioral health services.

Men's Homeless Shelter

Union Mission operates a case management-driven homeless shelter in Charleston that provides safe housing, meals, transportation assistance, and individualized support for men. The shelter focuses on helping residents overcome barriers to stability through connections to employment, housing, recovery services, healthcare, and family reunification. More than 9,000 shelter bed nights and 20,000 meals are provided annually. The Shelter achieves a 52% overall success rate, measured by participants exiting to permanent housing, residential recovery housing, family reunification, or other stable destinations, with outcomes improving to over 60% for individuals engaged beyond 90 days, demonstrating the effectiveness of sustained, case-managed interventions in achieving permanent housing stability.

Family Resource and Food Assistance Programs

Union Mission distributes more than 300,000 pounds of food annually to over 2,300 families through direct assistance, school-based programs, and partnerships with community food pantries. Services include food distribution, clothing assistance, crisis support, and resource referrals for individuals and families facing economic hardship. Particular emphasis is placed on serving children, seniors, and rural communities throughout West Virginia.

Through its outreach initiatives, Union Mission partners with churches, schools, food pantries, healthcare organizations, and community groups to address food insecurity and basic needs. The organization supports a network of partner agencies and pantries across the state, helping extend services into underserved communities.

Thrift Store and Social Enterprise Operations

Union Mission operates thrift stores and retail enterprises that provide affordable goods to the community while generating revenue to support the organization's charitable programs. These operations also create vocational opportunities for individuals rebuilding their lives following addiction or homelessness.

Disaster Relief and Emergency Response

Through the Bud Young Emergency Response Team and other outreach efforts, Union Mission responds to natural disasters, family emergencies, and other crises by providing resources, supplies, and direct assistance to affected individuals and communities.

Together, these programs create an integrated continuum of care that addresses immediate needs while helping individuals achieve long-term recovery, housing stability, employment, family reunification, and self-sufficiency. Each program supports

our mission of restoring hope, rebuilding lives, and renewing communities across West Virginia.

Union Mission has a demonstrated track record of successfully managing grant-funded projects, maintaining compliance with funding requirements, and leveraging public and private investments to expand services for individuals and families impacted by substance use disorder, homelessness, and poverty.

Please describe three significant accomplishments of your organization within the last three years.

1. Expansion and Certification of a Comprehensive Addiction Recovery Continuum

Over the past three years, Union Mission significantly strengthened its substance use disorder recovery services by developing a comprehensive continuum of care that includes a WVARR- and OHFLAC-certified residential recovery program, supervised sober living, peer support, behavioral health services, and recovery-focused case management. The program serves men experiencing substance use disorder, opioid use disorder, justice involvement, and co-occurring mental health conditions, providing long-term recovery support at no cost to participants. The program maintains strong recovery engagement and retention outcomes and serves as an important reentry and recovery resource for courts, probation and parole, hospitals, and treatment providers throughout the region.

2. Securing Funding and Launching the Recovery Without Barriers Construction Project

Union Mission successfully secured more than \$900,000 toward the construction of Recovery Without Barriers, a new 24-bed ADA-compliant residential recovery facility that will become the only ADA-accessible supervised residential treatment program for men in Kanawha County. Funding has been secured through state appropriations, property sales, fundraising efforts, private donations, and organizational investments. Construction is currently underway and will eliminate a critical gap in the continuum of care by expanding access to treatment for individuals with mobility limitations while creating a safer, purpose-built recovery environment for those affected by opioid and substance use disorders.

3. Expansion of Food Assistance and Community Outreach Services

Union Mission substantially expanded its food distribution and community outreach efforts, providing more than 300,000 pounds of food annually to over 2,300 families throughout West Virginia. The organization strengthened partnerships with schools, churches, community pantries, healthcare providers, and food banks, expanding access to nutritious food for children, seniors, and rural communities facing food insecurity. These efforts have increased the organization's reach, improved family stability, and reinforced Union Mission's role as a key community resource serving individuals and families experiencing hardship across the region.

Union Mission Ministries, Inc. is a West Virginia nonprofit corporation organized under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and does not have private owners or shareholders. The organization is led by a Chief Executive Officer and a senior leadership team responsible for day-to-day operations, financial management, program oversight, and strategic planning.

Kayla Smailes, Director of Family Resources and Outreach

Oversees food distribution, family assistance programs, outreach services, resource coordination, and community partnerships.

His responsibilities include strategic planning, project oversight, stakeholder engagement, fundraising coordination, grant compliance, and ensuring the project aligns with Union Mission's mission and long-term recovery objectives. He will serve as the primary organizational decision-maker and liaison with funders and community partners.

Kelly McClung, Director of Finance

Mrs. McClung oversees all financial aspects of the project, including budget management, grant administration, financial reporting, contractor payments, accounting compliance, audit documentation, and stewardship of project funds. She will ensure all expenditures are properly tracked and comply with funding requirements.

Ashley Smith, LPC, ALPS, Recovery Director

Mrs. Smith will oversee program planning and operational implementation within the new facility. She is responsible for ensuring the recovery program and its facilities meets the requirements of WVARR and OHFLAC, while providing evidence-based services to residents. She is also responsible for coordinating participant services, supervising recovery staff, maintaining regulatory compliance, and monitoring program outcomes. She also coordinates integration of behavioral health services and treatment programming into the existing program and new facility.

Joe Young, Director of Ministries

Mr. Young assists with participant engagement, program transition planning, volunteer coordination, community partnerships, and spiritual support services. He supports recovery programming and will help ensure continuity of care as participants transition into the new facility.

Recovery Program Staff

The recovery program team includes a Recovery Coordinator, 6 Recovery Associates, and 3 Peer Mentors, and 3 Peer Recovery Support Specialists will assist with facility transition planning, participant orientation, daily operations, recovery programming, resident supervision, and ongoing participant support. These staff members provide direct services, accountability, mentoring, and recovery support for residents.

Burdette Realty Improvement, Inc. (BRI)

BRI serves as the project's general contractor and is responsible for facility construction, project management, permitting, inspections, labor coordination, and project completion. BRI designed the facility and is managing all construction activities necessary to deliver a fully ADA-compliant 24-bed residential recovery building.
